Amber Harris, CPRS, I-FPRS, COAPS, is a trauma-informed Certified Peer Recovery Specialist, Integrated Forensic Peer Recovery Specialist, and Certified Older Adults Peer Recovery Specialist. Currently employed as a CPRS at Henrico County's Division of Fire CARE Team, she collaborates with Public Safety to reduce overdoses in the community and connect county residents with recovery support services. A participant in the Henrico Leadership Certification Program, Amber initiated a monthly outreach program with Daily Planet and established a Recovery 101 meeting in Henrico County. With previous roles as a CRAFT trained Recovery Coach and Interventionist, and as a Recovery Support Manager for Seeking Depth to Recovery, Amber brings a wealth of experience. She has received training in psychodrama, somatic-informed mindfulness, family systems, and ego state interventions. Additionally, she is certified as a MARS, DEIJ, ROWS, and REVIVE Trainer of Trainers and she is CIT trained. Amber specializes in community outreach, harm reduction, substance use disorder education and prevention, public speaking, and program development and implementation. She thrives on collaborating with internal and external stakeholders to enhance client support. Previously, she contributed to Project Recover for one year, an Opioid Abatement Project through the Attorney General's Office. In her own journey of long-term recovery from substance use disorder, Amber draws on her lived experiences to support clients on their path to health. A proud mother of three daughters, she resides in Richmond, VA.

Andrea Hess, LPC, is the Emergency Services Manager at the Fairfax-Falls Church CSB. Prior to joining Fairfax CSB in July of 2023, she was a supervisor for PWC CSB's Emergency Services Program. She has over 20 years as a Certified Prescreener. She currently serves as the Vice-President of VACIT Board of Directors and became involved in CIT in 2011, an instructor in 2013 and was awarded the VACIT Behavioral Health Provider of the Year in 2020 as well as assist the Greater Prince William County CIT program be awarded the 2022 VACIT Program of the Year.

**Angela Garrett** is the Regional Geriatric Specialist and is part of the Geriatric Transition team at Mount Rogers Community Services Board.

**Annette Clark** is the Dementia and Geriatric Specialist at the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services.

**Ashton Morse, LPC,** earned his Master's of Education in Community Counseling at the College of William and Mary. He holds a license as a Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) in Virginia. Ashton has worked with Encompass Community Supports (formerly Rappahannock-Rapidan Community Services) in since September 2012. He worked in the field of crisis services for his entire career. He still works with ECS as the Director of Community Response which oversees the programs for emergency services, CIT, co-response, the overdose response unit, and mobile crisis.

**Becky Graser, MSW R-CPRS,** currently serves as the Middle Peninsula Northern Neck Community Services Board (MPNNBH) Program Coordinator of Recovery Services. Becky develops and manages peer run programs and budgets; directly and/or indirectly supervises all individuals employed by the Recovery Services; guides the agency and serves as consultant and advocate to the agency staff in establishing recovery-oriented best practices; and develops new programs and employment opportunities for people in recovery from Mental Health Substance Use Disorder challenges. Recovery Services of MPNN consist of two Peer Run Resource centers providing safe recovery environments for the communities they serve and its people; a supportive employment program, currently employing over 40 peers in recovery; offers many training and peer support opportunities. Becky earned her BS from Virginia Commonwealth University and a MSW from the University of New England. Most importantly, Becky is a person in long term recovery from substance abuse challenges, with a willingness to publicly acknowledge and share her personal experiences, and serve as a recovery role model for others in recovery by representing their needs in the agency through the lens of lived experience. Becky serves or has served on the Board of Directors of NAMI, VOCAL and DBHDS.

**Buzz Barnet, LCSW** served as the Director of Emergency Services at Region Ten Community Services for over twenty years before retiring in 2015. Buzz is a past chair of the Emergency Service Council.

Cheryl St. John LPC, CSAC, CPSC, is the Supervisor for the Virginia Beach Department of Human Services Emergency Services and the Crisis Management units. She has been employed with Virginia Beach Department of Human Services for 25 years, joining the City of Virginia Beach in 1998. She has over 30 years working in Human Services field, specializing in mental health and addiction, treating individuals with SMI and/or Co-Occurring disorders, providing Crisis Counseling, Crisis Intervention, and Crisis Stabilization in order to assist with their recovery so they can remain stable in their community. Mrs. St John is a current member of the Virginia Beach Crisis Intervention Team and became an instructor for VB CIT at its inception in 2008. As supervisor for Emergency Services, in conjunction with the VBDHS Leadership Team, Virginia Beach Police Department, and the Virginia Beach Crisis Intervention Team program, she implemented the Virginia Beach Mobile Co-Responder Team (MCRT). Mrs. St. John is a Licensed Professional Counselor, Certified Substance Abuse Counselor, and has been certified as a Preadmission Screening Clinician by the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services since 2005. She earned her Bachelor of Science degree in Anthropology, from the College of Charleston in 1995, and earned her Master of Arts in Urban Education - Community Counseling at Norfolk State University in 2003. In 2013, she received additional training in Critical Incident Stress Management, and became registered as a clinical supervisor by the Virginia Board of Counseling, in order to assist with the professional growth of Residents in Counseling.

Christine DuBois, CPRS, currently serves as the Lead Peer Specialist at Rappahannock Area Community Services Board. Christine provides support, leadership, and professional development to the Peer Recovery Specialist Team, which includes 14 peer specialists including the support of 4 volunteers for Growing Recovery, a peer run organization that facilitates peer run support groups online.
